All that extensive Salmon Fishery called the Meadow Haven, well known to be both most productive and improveable, situate immediately behind Berwick Pier on the North side of the Tweed, extending Eastward over the Rock and into the Deep Sea, and Northward all along the shore of the Magdalene Fields, in the Borough of Berwick-upon-Tweed, now occupied by the Proprietors and by Mr. Johnston Borthwick, heir tenant of part thereof.

And all the Sea Weed on the coast along the shore of Magdalene Fields aforesaid, with the right of cutting, collecting, disposing or carrying it away (save only what may be taken to be used upon the lands of Magdalene Fields), now let to Mr. Johnston Borthwick at the rent of £65 on a lease which expires 12th November next.
